

Positions Vacant: Honorary Secretary

Looking for an exciting new role? The BOC is looking for a new Secretary. The seven year itch has got me and I feel it is time for a change. Here is the job description - don't worry, it's not that onerous: the Committee is generally well-behaved and the compliance bits are pretty straightforward, there is lots of help available from the Charity Commission and if you want, you can call me.

The Honorary Secretary is one of three Executive Officers elected annually with no limit on the number of years for which the post may be held. The other Executive Officers are the President (currently Gordon Langsbury) and the Honorary Treasurer (currently John Roberts). By convention, the Executive Officers also act as the Trustees of the charity. Although subject to annual re-election, the Secretary-ship is expected to be held for a long term, providing a degree of continuity in the management of the Club. The main duties of the Secretary are:

- To organise and minute the statutory General meetings of the Club (generally one per year) and the meetings of the Committee and progress decisions.
- To act as the first point of contact or "post box" for the Club on any matter (directing enquiries to other officers as appropriate).
- To ensure compliance with Charity law and the Club's constitution.
- To prepare and submit Annual Returns to the Charity Commission.
- To act as a co-signatory on Club bank account transactions (advised by the Treasurer).
- To prepare and send out annual and occasional mailings to members.
- To work with the Chair and Committee to evolve and deliver the Club's development strategy.

and, like other Committee members, the Secretary may take a lead in specific initiatives of the Club.

'Sponsor a species' for the New Atlas

The Birds of Berkshire Atlas for which the fieldwork is now underway will cost about £30,000. The Berkshire Bird Atlas Group (mainly BOC Committee members) is seeking funds for this and has made good progress. However, this is a massive sum and so, to involve our members and birdwatchers across the County, it has launched a 'Sponsor a species' appeal.

The prices for sponsorship are between £20 and £50 and you can increase the benefit to the project by 25% if you are a taxpayer by making the donation via the BOC and ticking the Gift Aid box. If we manage to find sponsors for the 300 plus species we will have raised well over £6000.

What's in it for me you may ask? Well, if helping to produce this landmark volume with data that will be of value for many years, to help protect the countryside and help ensure farming aid and other grants go to the right places is not enough, you get 20% off the price of a new book and your name will appear in it as the species sponsor.

The BOC is fully behind this project, hence creating an Appeal Fund for it, so we hope you will be able to support it and 'Sponsor a species'!

A Reminder from the Membership Secretary

A number of people have yet to renew their BOC memberships for the current year, which was due, as always, on the 1st October. <u> AGM Financial Report – Summary</u>

The Conservation Fund stands at $\pounds 5,826$, an increase of $\pounds 1,177$. Special mention was made of $\pounds 631$ income from the sale of Derrick's Foskett's natural history books, and expenditure of $\pounds 300$ on barn owl nest boxes.

Club Accounts stand at £10,198, an increase of £572. This is a pleasing increase as £2,400 has been spent on the 2004 Report. Income from subscriptions and Gift Aid has been maintained.

The Committee are considering two points and comment on them is invited from members.

- 1. A possible increase in subscriptions, was last raised in 2003. Although our financial position is quite sound future income is not guaranteed and we anticipate additional expenditure on room hire, speakers and "catch-up" Reports.
- 2. Removal of the half-rate subscription option for future new members. Current members would retain the option. This consideration arises because at present the cost of a Report and the issue of Newsletters approaches £6 per member, but some only pay £7.50 or £10.

BOC Photographic Competition – 25th March 2009

In 2009, we will again be offering 3 categories in our competition, so get shooting now!

The categories will be as follows:-

- Best digiscoped bird (portrait or action shot)
- Best digital bird portrait
- Best digital bird action photograph



Each of the three categories will be judged and winners chosen by Gordon Langsbury and Dave Cromack who has kindly agreed to support us again. The meeting will then, on a show of hands, choose the overall winner who will win the Gordon Langsbury Cup, currently held by Bill Watts for his action shot of a Grey Heron (seen reproduced here).

Gift vouchers will be given in all categories for first place and second place and the overall winner. Additional prizes may be supplied on the night.

You may enter photographs entered before if you wish, so if you think one didn't get the attention it deserved feel free to try again. We encourage newcomers to show their photographs, an experienced photographer certainly does not win every time! You just might have the picture to catch the judges attention!

Due to time limitations on the night, we have changed the number of entries per section to just four per person, so you still have up to twelve chances to win prizes on the night so have a look through your photos and give it a go!

Overall rules

- Photographs will be of wild, non captive birds only
- The competition is open to paid up members of the BOC. New members may join on the night if they wish.
- No more than four entries per category per entrant.
- Entrants agree to any entered photographs being displayed by the BOC on it's website and used for publicity purposes, at the Club's discretion. The BOC will make reasonable attempts to ensure acknowledgement is given to photographers whose work is used in this way.
- Photographs will be judged on all factors including exposure, colour cast, focus, composition and form. The decision of the judges is final.
- To qualify as a digiscoped picture the photograph must have been taken through a telescope.
- Limited image manipulation is permissible e.g. removal of a twig or blade of grass, but no major changes to the bird image itself. Adjustment to exposure, sharpening, colour correction, sensor dust spotting and cropping and resizing is acceptable.
- The images, regardless of file size, image size and resolution will be adapted by the BOC for presentation as they see fit but without responsibility for the results.

Closing date for entries is 18 March 2009.

News from the TABCG

Breeding season news from around the area has been somewhat mixed. At Hosehill the terns on the island lost their eggs/ young chicks due to the high water levels in June and left early. Sadly, this is the first time in many years that the terns have not managed to raise any chicks in the Theale area as the ones on Main Pit also lost their eggs/chicks. On a happier note about 17 pairs of Sand Martins have bred in the wall at Hosehill.

Maintenance work is always ongoing, especially at Hosehill, where refurbishment of the Sand Martin wall has been started with vegetation being cleared and the roof removed to allow the sand to get wet. Other preparatory work has been carried out by the Dragonfly Pond in readiness for the annual clearance work. Also of interest, is the new "Insect Hotel" consisting of pallets and pipes and a variety of different sizes of vegetation, on the Butterfly Bank, to provide shelter for some of the smaller residents. Plans are being developed to create a wader scrape on the front of the island at Hosehill, assuming that it gains approval from

the Environment Agency. This work will require some funding and also good timing as it will need to be done outside the breeding season when the water levels are relatively low.
