

BOC Photographic Competition – March 4th 2015

The annual Club Photographic Competition continues to go from strength to strength. The standard of entries this year was excellent, making life even harder for our judges (Dickie Duckett and Paul Keene) who, before the evening, had already spent time eliminating a number of very good entries, to make the number of entries on the evening more manageable. Despite this, the judges still had some 80 pictures to get through on the night which meant, as usual, that we were struggling to complete the proceedings before our end time of 10pm!

After the judges had looked at and discussed the entries they decided on a winner and runner-up in each category, and it was then down to the audience to vote for the picture that would be the overall winner and new holder of the Gordon Langsbury Trophy.

- In the Portrait category, the winner was Dave Rimes with his beautifully composed picture of a Dartford Warbler with John Walker's full-face image of an Eider Drake taking the runner-up prize.
- In the Action category, Bill Watts took the dramatic winning picture featuring an Eider Duck with its young heading out to sea, with Bill also taking the runner-up slot with his picture of a pair of Great Crested Grebes.
- In the Flight category, David Moran took the prize with his stunning image of a Red Kite in the rain, with joint runners-up Dave Rimes (Lesser Kestrel in flight) and Steven Day (Sand Martin flying over water).

The 3 category winnings pictures are reproduced here to give an idea of their quality, although this method of reproduction hardly does them justice.



Vote for the New National Bird

You may have heard about a campaign (fronted by David Lindo, the Urban Birder) for Britain to choose a new National Bird. Apparently the last time any vote was taken was in the mid 60s and the Robin was the chosen favourite - but will it retain its top spot? The vote coincides with the General Election (and arguably might be more fruitful?) and ends at midnight on May 7th. The original list has been whittled down to 10 birds, consisting of Barn Owl, Mute Swan, Blackbird, Puffin, Blue Tit, Red Kite, Hen Harrier, Robin, Kingfisher and Wren.

BOC Evening Walk to the Berkshire Downs – June 2014



On arrival at the meeting place I was pleasantly surprised to see 16 people already gathered waiting to set off on this evening walk on the Berkshire Downs, a walk which promised a number of farmland species, some quite rare and others, for the time being, fairly common, but nevertheless restricted to this downland habitat. We hadn't gone far when we looked across a valley to an arable field on the far side, and found in a weedy area a pair of Stone Curlews. Farmers in the area are encouraged to leave bare patches in their arable crops to attract Stone Curlews to breed, making it slightly easier to locate them, though by the time the chicks hatch, the weeds are well-grown and provide ample cover. Brown Hares and Woodpigeons were also attracted to this part of the field.

We continued our walk towards the ancient Ridgeway Path by a less direct route, and along the way had good views of Yellowhammers, Whitethroats, Linnets, Corn Buntings and a Muntjac in the hedgerows. At the Ridgeway, we inspected another bare field where a Grey Partridge melted into the background and would have been invisible but for the jet black crescent on its belly. Another sharp-eyed observer pointed out a distant Barn Owl, hunting three fields away and a Redlegged Partridge perched uncharacteristically on top of a farm building. We continued along the Ridgeway a short distance to a point where we had a good vantage out to the west, and listened for calling birds. We had hoped to hear Quail calling but it was not to be – just an overhead Grey Heron and Ray Reedman's hearing aid.

So we retraced our steps a short way along the Ridgeway and checked out the bare strip in the failing light. An unusual movement at the edge of the crop alerted Andy T's attention and we were treated to the sight of a Badger and two cubs ambling away along the field edge. Nearby a Buzzard perched on a fence post, then as we were about to leave, an owl flew over the Ridgeway just by us. Was it white or brown? After a minute staring into the gloom, by which time it had been joined by another, we realised we were watching a pair of Barn Owls. A good note to end on!
